Brown barren treelines explode in green with the renewal of the leaves, and scratchy dead fields rise up in renewal with grass, wildflowers, and the actions of critters of all kinds great and small.

To be ever alive means to be ever renewing, and that is true for us as well as for the rest of the natural world. When I remember that fact, I see possibility all around,

A Generous In-Kind Donation Received

FUSH recently received a substantial credit on our church electric bill – enough to cover several months of our normal usage. The credit came from a friend of the church (who wishes to remain anonymous) with solar panels that generated far more electricity than they consumed in the year. Vermont regulations specify a few ways a net metering customer can use such a credit – and one of the ways is to transfer it to another customer of the same utility. (They also have the option of creating a group of customers who would share the power. Without far more research, it is not entirely clear how this would work, and this particular GMP customer was interested in helping the church budget.) My understanding is that if the credit is not applied to either your own bill, or used in some other way, it disappears.

This is a fine example for others in our congregation who have solar arrays that are generating excess power. If you have such a credit and don't have a way to spend it on your own account, I would be happy to discuss this with you. If you have excess credits but are not a GMP customer, you could probably find a willing recipient in the service area of your utility.

While I was at it, I checked the New Hampshire regulations on this matter. If a NH net metering customer has more than 600 kWH in their "bank" at the end of the March billing cycle, on or before June 1, the utility must offer them a check for the unused kWH, a credit on their bill for that amount, or let the "bank" continue to accumulate. Since the net metering does not cover the monthly connect fee (which for the NH Electric Coop is pretty steep), a credit could make some sense. Since we have the option of allowing the "bank" to continue to grow, Rickey and I will probably do that this year. We did not have to clear our panels of snow very often this year, and it does look as if we generated more this winter than some months last winter. That small cushion carried forward might be nice to have if next winter is closer to a normal snow fall.

Based in Claremont, NH, Turning Points Network strives to end all forms of domestic abuse, sexual assault and stalking. Winter Reflections & Spring Connections

Gently taking in these early spring moments, one cannot help but feel filled with gratitude. We are actively engaging in plans for the months ahead, while also mindfully allowing space for final meditations on the past months. 
