While pursuing happiness can sometimes be an escapist activity, cultivating deeper levels of happiness can also be a valuable spiritual practice -- especially as it relates to the final clause in our mission, protecting the earth, our home. Ginny Sassaman will share some ways positive psychology research has shown how to raise our individual levels of happiness, and discuss how increased happiness can help us better address the challenges of climate change.

Ginny Sassaman grew up in Central Pennsylvania where she married her high school sweetheart, had two children, and got a BA in communications from Penn State before moving to Washington, D.C. to be Media Communications Director for Common Cause. She later worked for American University and the Women's Legal Defense Fund. Ginny left the D.C. fast track to pursue a fulltime art career as a watercolor painter. In 2001, she and her husband Bob moved to Vermont. In 2006, Ginny returned to school, earning a Master's in Mediation and Applied Conflict Studies at Woodbury College in VT. Since then, she created the position of staff mediator for Home Share Now; co-founded Gross National Happiness USA; and created The Happiness Paradigm Store and Experience in Maple Corner. Today she works as a mediation coach, an artist, a workshop facilitator, and a writer/advocate for happiness at Happinessparadigm.wordpress.com. She also logs many happy hours as a grandmother. She is a member of the Montpelier, Vermont Unitarian Church.

The Board's Broadcast

A request to find an auditor for the church was published in the previous newsletter, but there was no response. Doug Hart will continue to seek an auditor for the church finances. Worst case may be that we have to pay an independent auditor. We are also seeking an assistant treasurer, to help and backstop Doug.

Doug has set up the direct withdrawal process with Mascoma Bank, which will save us the transaction charge we have been paying for this process previously. We will encourage contributors to sign up for periodic direct withdrawal whenever pledging, as this will make cash flow more predictable.

Currently, the church financial information resides on Doug Hart's personal laptop, which is slow and cumbersome. The Board discussed getting a church laptop to support the treasurer and other church functions. John reported that Chuck Fenton may be able to get a used but well-performing laptop through his business contacts. The board authorized spending up to \$400 for a church laptop to support Doug and hold the financial data; Doug will contact Chuck about this.

The Board reviewed upcoming events; no Board actions seem to be needed.

John has reviewed part of the bylaws pertaining to business meetings, comparing to suggested formats provided by the UUA of Northern New England. This is part of the ongoing process of revising the bylaws to better reflect our organization. Changes proposed are detailed below. Members of the community are invited to participate in the bylaws revision process by sending comments and ideas to the board. This important process should help make the FUSH bylaws better for all members of the church. Further sections of the bylaws will be reviewed in upcoming Board meetings.

The next Board meeting will be on April 1 at 7:00 pm. As always, members are invited to attend Board meetings, and let Board members know about any issue requiring Board attention

Proposed Bylaw Changes

The "annual" and "semiannual" meeting names are changed to "Winter" and "Spring" semiannual meetings. The Winter meeting is held in the first half of December and the Spring meeting in the last half of May. This is to remove the confusion about when the "annual" and "semiannual" meetings occur. The meeting dates are made slightly more flexible, and the actual dates are set by the Board within the guidelines.

Notice of business meetings will be posted in the church at least 30 days before the meetings, and include at least four Sundays. Notice will be published in the newsletter, unless the newsletter is not being published, in which case the notice will be sent via email to everyone with an email address, and by postal mail otherwise. The notice must be sent at least 10 days before the meeting.

Notice of special business meetings must be posted at least 15 days, to include two Sundays in the church. These meetings will be announced by email and postal mail, as above.

Notice of meetings will state the business of the meeting and votes to be taken.

The Winter meeting will have the vote to approve the church budget for the coming year and other business. The Spring meeting will have the vote to elect members of the Governing Board and other business.

Proxy voting will be allowed by written, signed votes, unless the Governing Board prohibits proxy voting on a specific issue. This is a major change from the current bylaws, which prohibit proxy voting. Clearly, we want as many members as possible to participate in the decisions of running the church.

Capital Campaign Committee

We are happy to report that we have raised \$87,000 (including a state historic grant for \$20,000 and \$5,000 from the Jack and Dorothy Byrne Foundation) towards our \$100,000 goal. We are in the last phases of our campaign to raise all the money we need to repair our building and grounds and to have a fund for building maintenance.

Work will begin on the steeple by Jan Lewandoski in March followed by drainage work and the painting of the building. We also hope to have enough funds to refurbish the basement social room.

Once the steeple is down we want to have a celebration to show our appreciation to all those in the community who have supported this effort and been so generous.

Save the date of Friday, May 31

for an all community celebration given jointly by FUSH and the Hartland Historical Society.

At 6:00 pm after the ringing of our historic bell we will gather around the spire which will be on the ground and have a chance to ask questions of Jan Lewandoski, our steeple jack.

To celebrate this important occasion if anyone has historic clothes of the 1850's you are welcome to wear them. Also, for the cooks at FUSH if you have your grandmother's cook book you are welcome to make dishes which would have been served in the same time period.

The Upper Valley Apple Corps (UVAC) fruit tree planting project was created with the goal of planting and caring for 250 fruit trees in visible public locations over the next three years. On May 18 of this year, UVAC aims to plant its first 50 apple, peach and pear trees. This day will be a learning and celebration festival for all involved. Experts will demonstrate proper planting and care of our new trees.
