### From Your Minister

June is always a time of transition in the life of our church. We begin June in busyness, with our annual tent worship, and welcoming of new members, and then marking the shifting of our energy and focus in our religious education program as we recognize transitions and connections on Children's Sunday. General Assembly is a busy time of connection and energy for those of us who are able to attend. This year, with GA taking place relatively nearby in Providence, I know we'll have a few more folks from our congregation there, if not for the whole time, then for the Sunday morning worship service on June 29, which is free and open to the public.

Beginning this month we also have a bit fewer meetings and big events in the life of the church, though we continue on throughout the summer with regular worship and religious education. We're gearing up for the youth mission trip, taking place in July. Otherwise our regular youth group meetings have ended until the fall, which creates some space in my own schedule, which I appreciate—though I definitely miss my regular connections with the young people of our extended community.

The summer in our church is, I hope, a somewhat lighter time. We have our regular events to prepare for, including our important fundraiser at Hartland's Old Home Day on July 4. In worship and in our church life in general, I always hope that there's also a simpler spirit, and a freedom to try some new things, and to let our energy and imagination stretch, and to let ourselves enjoy our time together with a spirit of fun.

Because we have several "set" services in the summer time—like the tent meeting at Connie's, Children's Sunday, our joint Independence Day service with the Congregational Church, and the youth mission trip service—we have fewer "regular" worship services. In the three months of summer, we'll use just two "Engaging the Spirit" themes. For June and the first part of July, our theme will be "Mystery." And then for the rest of summer, we'll explore "Growing Faith."

As we deepen into "Mystery" in the weeks to come, I can think of no better introduction than this poem by Mary Oliver, which many of you know has become one of my favorites:

### Semi-Annual Meeting of the First Universalist Society of Hartland Four Corners May 18, 2014

The Semi-Annual Meeting of our Society was held on Sunday, May 18, 2014, following the service. With Sue Buckholz serving as the moderator for the meeting, the congregation approved our nominating committee's recommendations, electing Coral Lydon Ovitt and Michael Theroux as new members of our Governing Board, joining five others who are serving in continuing terms: Mary Erdei, Sara Morin, Dan Poor, Tamara Ross, and Colleen Spence.

Written annual reports from volunteer leaders and staff members were circulated before the meeting to those on our newsletter mailing list (by e-mail and regular mail), and comments and questions were taken at the meeting. If you didn't get a copy of the annual reports, contact Nancy Walker in the office for a copy, and to be sure that you're on the mailing list for our monthly newsletter.

Also at this meeting, we recognized John Osborne and Becky Howe, who are completing terms of service on the Board as President and Secretary, respectively. A special recognition was made to Doug Hart, who is retiring from membership on our Governing Board after a remarkable 18 years of service, including a term as President, and serving the last 11 years or so as our Treasurer. Paul Sawyer presented Doug with a hand-forged Swedish axe, noting that like the axe, Doug has been durable, reliable, useful, strong, and especially—sharp—in service to our congregation.

### The Board's Broadcast

The Board met on May 12. Present were Dan Poor, Becky Howe, Mary Erdei, Paul Sawyer, Colleen Spence, and John Osborne.

The Board reviewed the minister's report.

Paul, Sara Doolan, Katie Sawyer and family attended the Northern New England District (NNED) Annual Meeting in Concord, NH. Paul reviewed the status of the NNED redistricting to become part of a larger organization, and that the districts are combining staffs and proposing a redistribution of their efforts to provide essentially more flexibility in the support of the member districts.

There is a communications issue with the various Circles between the Board and the congregation. The Circles need to be aware that communicating changes to the membership and the Board is important to prevent the congregation being surprised by changes and plans that they are not aware of.

The issue of funding for people attending the General Assembly in Providence came up, with a request to perhaps give one or two of the weekly collections to this purpose, but it was generally agreed not to do this, as the weekly collections are designated to go to community support, and not functions within the church. The possibility of a fundraiser to support the GA attendees was also discussed, but at this late date, seems unlikely. The possibility of maintaining a special fund for attending GA was also discussed, as the location and dates of GA are known years in advance.

The Treasurer's report was deferred, as the Treasurer was not present.

The Board discussed the issue of having an Assistant Treasurer, which was discussed in December and earlier, and dividing the Treasurer's duties between two people. The Finance Circle was formed in support of the transition to a new Treasurer, but an Assistant Treasurer was never nominated. Tamara may be overwhelmed by the amount of work involved in being the church Treasurer, and there had been discussions in the past about dividing the duties between receipts and expenditures, but this was not implemented.

Dan Poor proposed that the Board, with new members, meet informally after the Semi-Annual Meeting and elect the new officers. The alternative is that the Board will elect officers at the June meeting. The newly elected and re-elected Board will meet briefly after the Semi-Annual Meeting.

John reported on his attendance at the Vermont – Quebec Convention that took place in Barre on May 3. The meeting was an annual meeting that covered business topics of the Vermont – Quebec Convention. The meeting discussed the bylaw changes that are proposed, election of new officers, the role and need for Trustees of the endowment, and the distribution of funds from the endowment's income.

The bylaw discussion centered on the requirement that members of the Convention have in their bylaws that should a church fail, the property of the church will automatically become the property of the Convention. This does not impact us, as we already have this in our bylaws.

The discussion of the Trustees is that since the entire endowment, about \$600,000, is in the UUA General Endowment Fund, there is no need for Trust Advisory Committee in the Convention. This is countered by the point that the UUA Fund is performing poorly, and an active group of Trustees could search for funds which perform better. This might also be instructive to us.

The distribution of the earnings was described by the Treasurer. Essentially, there is a 5% of earnings distribution to specific "restricted" funds, of which this church has one, the Spear fund. This amount to us will be \$152.31. The remainder of the earnings, \$18,825.49, will be divided equally into 20 shares, so we will be receiving \$941.27 from the Convention, in addition to the amount for the Spear fund.

Finally, John volunteered our church for the location of the next Vermont –Quebec Convention annual meeting, on May 9, 2015. In addition to providing the church space, this will entail providing refreshments and a post-meeting luncheon for about 30 people.

Mary Erdei continued to send out thank-you notes this month.

The agenda of the Semi-Annual Meeting was briefly discussed. It is a short agenda, namely:

- Questions and discussion of the various Circle and Chairs reports.
- Elections of the new Board members.

There will be a potluck luncheon after the meeting; the Board decided on the contributions of the various Board members.

The meeting adjourned at 8:34 pm. This was the last meeting to be attended by John Osborne and Becky Howe, who have resigned from the Board. Paul thanked them for their service. The next meeting of the Board will be on June 9 at 7:00 pm. As always, members of the congregation are invited to attend.
