Like most local libraries, the Windsor Public Library is a central cultural and community resource for the town it serves, and for others in our region. Unlike the libraries in most other communities, however, the WPL is not an agency of the town government of Windsor—it is now, and has been historically, a separate corporation, dependent on donations of resources and time from the wider community. Though they do usually receive an allocation voted on at the Windsor town meeting, the WPL does not enjoy anywhere near the kind of municipal support available in many communities. Several members and friends of our congregation have been leaders and strong supporters of the WPL for many years, and

They offer comprehensive services for families and children, including home visits. training and support for new parents, early intervention for children with special needs, and ongoing education, playgroups, resources for financial aid for child care, and other support for families. They also operate an important service through their child advocacy center, working with state agencies to offer a safe environment for legal testimony and follow-up support for children who have made a disclosure of abuse.
