350VT is our local chapter of the international organization 350.org, working to counter the impact of climate change in our region and all around the world. 350VT organizes direct action events, works to advocate for meaningful governmental response, and otherwise works to inspire people to an effective response to the challenges of the current state of our climate. The name comes from the scientific assertion that the maximum concentration of carbon in our atmosphere to avoid serious consequences for our climate is 350 parts per million. Unfortunately, the current concentration is about 392 PPM and climbing. More information is available at 350VT.org. From Your Minister

Engaging the Spirit—Creation

For as long as there have been humans to contemplate the universe we have wondered where it all began. For most people wondering about creation is simply an impulse that comes and goes, and most of the time we just file it away with all those other odd unanswerable thoughts and questions that run through our heads every now and then.

But for some, that very same deep unanswerable quality is a calling. They just cannot let go until they have made some sense of how the universe began, how the world arose, how humanity came to be. And so they spend lifetimes searching, and wondering, and asking.

From these rare people over the course of human history we have received incredible gifts—amazing stories of creation. In all times, these stories have given the rest of us a way to understand our own occasional wondering. "Where do we come from? Ah, the stories say that..." and then we can get back to making the rest of our lives work.

Every one of these stories, every creation story ever told contains a part of the truth. And yet no story ever told has ever contained all of the truth—at least not yet.

This dual condition—this paradox of the drive to know more, and the reality that there will always be more than we can know—it has inspired amazing thinkers and leaders in our society—storytellers, philosophers, scientists, theologians, and artists.

In early societies, the scientists, the philosophers, the religious leaders, and often the artists, too, were all the same people. They were the ones who paid attention to the workings of the world and cared to notice how things were. It was the priests of the society that built Stonehenge who knew just where to place the stones, and how big they needed to be, because they knew where the sun would rise on certain days of the year. The discoveries they made that could assure the people that the sun was returning to bring spring were scientific and holy.

The shaman and the scientist, the priestess and the astronomer, the monk and the biologist, they have been one and the same throughout much of human history.

In our day and age we've come to see the science and the spiritual as separate entities, and as incompatible paths in the search for what is true. And so for many of us, on the liberal side of the religious world, that very word, "creation" brings with it some suspicion and some looks of rolling eyes.

But creation is what we do. And creation is where we live. And every tendril of unfolding knowledge in our world is a great gift of the spirit. Religious conservatives often complain that modern science pulls people away from their religious grounding. As a religious liberal, I'd say it almost exactly the other way around—that religious understanding has too often neglected to see the wonder and amazement that our science affords, and also that those of us with "scientific" minds too often fail to understand our commitment to exploration and the increase of knowledge as an act of faith.

The universe is an amazing place. All of creation is the home of the spirit. All our creation is an act of the spirit. The wonders of science are a meaningful and fundamental part of my faith. And all the ancient stories of wonder from long ago are a meaningful and fundamental part of my faith. Because I know that both the science, and the ancient stories carry a part of the truth of creation—a truth that no story, whether we call it science or religion, has ever been able to tell in full.

October 12 — The Hutt Family Fund

As many of you will remember, Patience Hutt, a Hartland mother of four, died tragically in a car accident in 2013. As the Hutt family continues to recover from her loss, it's become clear that some additional financial assistance and other forms support from our community would go a long way toward providing for the immediate and future needs of the family, and particularly toward ensuring that the family has a safe and adequate place to live. Bill Gaucher, the owner of BG's Market, has established a fund to support the family, and he has also been instrumental in bringing neighbors and friends and builders together to do the needed work at the family's home. Situated in the old stone school in South Reading, the Reading-West Windsor Food shelf is a non-profit, all-volunteer organization whose primary mission is to provide nutritious, high-quality food to anyone who needs food assistance in Reading, West Windsor and adjacent communities. RWWFS has served more than 80 families in the past year. With several of our members living in the area served by RWWFS, we're honored to be able to support their work in our region. The Governing Board held its monthly meeting on September 8, 2014. In attendance were: Colleen Spence, Sara Morin, Tamara Ross, Michael Theroux, Mary Erdei, Paul Sawyer and Dan Poor.

Meeting minutes were reviewed briefly and it was decided that all meeting minutes for the summer would be reviewed at once and voted on for approval at the October meeting.

The Minister's report was reviewed.

There will be a training held for volunteer leaders at the beginning of November. The cost is a flat fee for 3-5 attendees. Paul hopes to get some key members of the church to attend.

It was noted that Dianne Rochford has graciously volunteered to be a part of the Stewardship Committee. We look forward to her participation in the effort to encourage stewardship. We think it is a great fit considering her enthusiasm and love for the church!

The Treasurer's Report was reviewed. Progress is being made to align categories of funds so that we can see what money is coming in and going out. The reporting needs of the Minister and the church are not quite being met by the documents presented currently. Tamara and Doug are working together regularly to improve the process. The Board approved the Treasurer's work to keep making forward progress.

The Fundraiser's Report was reviewed. Sara communicated her concern that marketing for the upcoming concert is a task that runs in conflict with her profession. It is a job she cannot do, ethically. And she points out that it is a job that needs to be done as a part of holding such an event. The Board agrees and will make sure to communicate with future event champions and followers to be sure the message is clear that marketing of the event is an important part of the organizational tasks of holding such an event.



Welcoming Congregation

After church on a Sunday in November the Welcoming Congregation initiative is hosting a Workshop entitled "What Next?" This is the last in the series prior to the vote to amend our by-laws and adopt official "Welcoming Congregation" status in December. A copy of the proposed amendment is on the back table in the Sanctuary. It will also be posted in November's newsletter. The initiative has been a year-long exploration of the experience in society of our fellow shipmates (think 'Blue Boat Home') who identify as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, or who question their sexual orientation (LGBTQ).

There is a committed group in our congregation who have been key to the progress of the Welcoming Congregation initiative, and you'll see rainbows on many nametags. These signify, if not active involvement, support for the effort and its outcomes.

However, what we haven't done, or not done well, is invite other voices into the conversation. At this point, to some of you, it may seem that becoming a Welcoming Congregation is a done deal. You may have questions or concerns that, because of the momentum of the initiative, you have been reluctant to share.

Those of us leading this effort want to hear from everyone. As much as we are committed to seeing this initiative through, we believe strongly in our UU ideals, and everyone should be heard. To that end, we will have a box, in the Food Pantry downstairs, where questions, comments, or concerns can be contributed anonymously. We will share and address all contributions in early November, both in the newsletter, and at a Sunday service.



The Healing Moment

Rev. Elizabeth Tarbox, From Life Tides

Each day I am newly reminded of my unworthiness—a dozen thoughts misspoken; another day when the good I do falls short of the good that I could do; myriad small interchanges; moments of sharing that strain to the breaking point my desire to be generous, helpful, and kind; months of careful work lost by a moment's impatience, a careless word.

But when I am here at the edge of creation, breaking with the small tide over the sand, the need to do good rolls away; the question of what is right diminishes to insignificance and is easily borne away by the tiny waves. Here, where no words are spoken, none are misspoken.

I am with the broken stubble of the marsh grass that holds on through the wrecking wind and the burning flood. I am with the grains that mold themselves around everything, accepting even so unworthy a foot as mine, holding and shaping it until it feels that it belongs. I stand somewhere between truth and vision, and what I don't know ceases to embarrass me, because what I do know is that the water feels gentle like a lover's touch, and the sand welcomes it.

What I have done or failed to do has left no noticeable mark on creation. What I do or don't do is of no moment now. Now I am here and grateful to be touched, calmed, and healed by the immense pattern of the universe. And when I die, it will be an honor for my blood to return to the sea and my bones to become the sand. Reassured, I am called back to my life, to another day.
