# From Your Minister

### **Engaging the Spirit—Vision**

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As we return to the more active season of our church year with the arrival of September and the beginning of the fall, we'll be re-connecting more directly with our "Engaging the Spirit" monthly worship themes, and the theme for September is "Vision."

The word "vision" carries many different meanings in our language. It refers to everything from the physical act of visual perception to a much grander notion, the sense of an all-encompassing understanding of direction and purpose for an organization or for our individual lives.

In the world of faith, the word "vision" has been associated since ancient times with many forms of direct communication sent from the realm of the Divine into the human world.

Indigenous religions from many parts of the world include rites of passage that in English we've come to call "Vision Quests"—dedicated periods of time when a person steps outside of the accumulated habits of their regular lives to seek out a special sense of spirit, and to open themselves to guidance, direction, and a grounding vision of faith, received from a sacred source of wisdom and spirit.

In the Hebrew scriptures, the prophet Joel tells the people a message that he's received from God, about how the people will respond when they're touched by God's Spirit: "I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy. Your old men will dream dreams, and your young men will see visions."

And also in the ancient Hebrew scriptures, in the Wisdom sayings of the book of Proverbs, tradition says that Solomon spoke the famous lines, "Where there is no vision, the people perish."

The Hebrew word translated as "vision" in the book of Proverbs in the King James Version, is in more modern versions translated as "revelation." And perhaps you can see that the two words, vision and revelation, are deeply connected, particularly in the language of faith. We hold a vision of the world we are working together to build. And for each of us, we look to, reach out to, our deepest sources of spirit, to find where the greatest possibilities of that hopeful vision might be revealed in the course of our lives.

As we begin a new church year, and as we continue, as always, to come together to do the work of building the kind of beloved community we know we are meant to be a part of, in our congregation, and in our wider society, we are following an ancient vision, passed down to us by our ancestors from many different paths of faith. We are also seeking to discern and to form and to hold a new vision of faith, grounded in our own place and time, in our own community, and shining, alive, revealed, in the deepest places of our own souls.

Whatever this year will bring our church community, whatever joys and sorrows, whatever new opportunities, new activities, new buildings(!), we may experience, may we always work to seek out, and to build, and to share the visions that guide us on the path of faith—new visions, ancient visions, and visions just now barely coming into form—our precious glimpses of the shining possibilities of the world we are working to build.



### Welcome to a new RE year!

This year our theme will be the history of Unitarian Universalism. We have several children who are in their last year of the K-6 RE program and my hope is that they have a broad education of our tradition. Last year our focus was on the principles, this year we'll look at the people and events that have been a part of UU. The older children will also have the opportunity to reflect on their own histories and to share these thoughts with each other and perhaps the whole congregation.

We will also be incorporating Spiritual Practices into our time in the Yurt. The children will be practicing quiet contemplative time; I am excited to try out various examples that I learned during my RE week at Star Island. We will continue to follow the RE schedule of Faith in Action, Guest Artist, and Spirit Play for the first three Sundays of each month. I appreciate any suggestions for Guest Artist and Faith in Action!

Last year, we were unable to hold the fifth/sixth grade OWL (Our Whole Lives) sexuality courses because we had no trained instructors. Hope-fully that will be resolved this year and we can offer the classes during the winter.

On September 14, registration forms will be available for new families to complete, and returning families can update any information. The RE schedule will be posted and the congregation is invited to sign up to volunteer to teach or assist in classes through December.

### September 14— Friends of Lemax Farm

The Lemax Farm in North Hartland is an iconic and important working farm, a remarkable example of 19th century agricultural architecture still functioning in a 21st century family farm. Ed and Kelley Meacham have been operating the farm for more than 20 years, and in recent years it's become clear that the reality of current dairy prices and expenses do not allow for the needed upkeep on these historic and beautiful ancient buildings. In addition, Ed and Kelley Meacham have consistently been leaders in our wider community, particularly concerning farmto-plate and other agricultural education programs. Recognizing the Meacham's significant role in the community, as well as the importance of the Lemax Farm for the social, agricultural, and visual atmosphere of our area, a group of local residents has come together, in partnership with the Vermont Land Trust, to work through donations, grants, and other fundraising opportunities, to build a fund to repair and preserve this landmark farm for the generations to come. 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#### A NEW WAY OF SHARING SPOKEN ANNOUNCEMENTS ON SUNDAY

Beginning this September, we'll be trying out a change in how we handle spoken announcements at the beginning of the service on Sunday mornings.

We'll be collecting announcements in writing, preferably by Thursday afternoon, and a member of

our Governing Board will read all the announcements from the microphone. So individual people won't have to come forward to make separate announcements any more.

If you can't get the information to us in advance, we'll also have some index cards available on Sunday

morning, so you can write down what you'd like said (hopefully well before the service begins). And if you let us know

in advance, we'll certainly make space if you'd like to make a special announcement, or present your announcement in a creative fashion, (like the famous and wonderful Todd/Mallory turkey supper announcements!).

We'll include your spoken announcement, and we'll also include any information you like in the printed bulletin, in Paul's weekly e-mail, and on the church on-line calendar (which is available on our web site, and which we also plan to begin using much more effectively beginning this fall).

Our hope is that this new process will help us improve both the timing and the clarity of our announcements before the service, and that it will also help us get important church information to a wider audience through our other forms of communication, since our spoken announcements each week reach

only a small percentage of our total population of the members and friends of our congregation.

We ask that for all announcements,



you follow these simple guidelines to help ensure that we're communicating needed church Announcements information effectively:

> • Announcements should generally be limited to church information or information about church-sponsored events.

• If time and space allow, announcements with a less direct but still significant connection to our church community are also wel-

come, but please understand that we are active people, living in an active region. and it's clear that if we don't place some limits on

what we're trying to share, particularly in our spoken announcements, we could quickly overwhelm our ability to communicate information specific to our church community in an effective manner.

• Spoken announcements should be brief, with more detailed information or instructions available in writing if needed.

• And also, especially as we get used to this change in our practice, please remember that our Candles of Joy and Sorrow are meant as a time of prayer, not as a time for informational announcements.

If you have questions, comments, or concerns, please contact our minister, Paul Sawyer. As with any change in the way we do things in our worship services, we'll try this change for a while before we make it permanent, and we'll be sure to assess how it's working, and make any needed adjustments along the way.

# The Board's Broadcast

It is my privilege to serve you all as President of the Governing Board for the next two years. I have been sitting on the Governing Board as a member and then Vice President for nearly two years, to date. Along with my appointment, Dan Poor graciously accepted the position of Vice President and Coral Lydon Ovitt, the position of Secretary.

I had put together a formal account of our summer meetings and realize it is way too long for the newsletter so I decided to summarize. These documents are available upon request, if you have a desire to wade through the minute-by-minute details of our monthly meetings.

It is an exciting time for the church. We learned very shortly after I took this position that the Ladies Aid Hall building was being put up for sale. The Trustees Committee urged the Board to act as quickly as possible to assure that we would be in position to purchase the building as soon as the opportunity arose. We pulled together an Ad Hoc Committee and researched and discussed the pros and cons of obtaining the building and then brought these thoughts to the congregation so that we could all vote together on the decision of purchaseing. The result of that vote was in favor of purchasing the building at or close to the assessed value of \$49,600. We currently have on hand, thanks to Gordon Richardson and the Richardson fund, granted specifically for the purpose of this purchase, approximately \$23,000 dollars, as well as, commitments from two families of \$10,000 each, for a total of \$43,000. If there are any major changes to the price and what we expect to be the contingencies in the contract, we will bring the decision back to the church to vote again. We are currently waiting for the arrival of the contract while the owner and his daughters have been busy with other property sales.

The prize for our newest fundraising endeavor goes to the Red Aprons, who have come together to provide event service for gatherings around the community. Red Aprons is available to set up, serve and clean up for the low, low price of \$500 or so depending on the party. They have a desire to purchase some chairs and tables to make available for rental, upon the approval of the Board.

At our June meeting, reporting on behalf of the Building and Grounds Committee, Doug Hart gave an update of the grading and draining work currently under way which includes tree removal and head-in parking along the street. Several projects are under consideration including some electrical work needed for the Steeple, a sound system upgrade (that would not come out of the capital renovation fund), and a hearing assistance system. He requested and received approval from the Board to proceed with a Line-Burying project which the Board approved.

The next Connection Circle meeting will be on Friday, September 5 at 4:00 pm in the Parsonage.


### **Coffee Hour**
