From Your Minister

Beginning this month, I'll be sending the extensive introduction to the theme—with all the quotes and definitions and poems—as a special item all to its own, separate from the newsletter. I'll give a brief introduction here, but my hope is to de-clutter the newsletter a bit, and also to give us a bit more room for depth in the theme introduction itself.

Our "Engaging the Spirit" theme for worship in March is an interesting one: "Letting Go." And I have to admit that my first thoughts on thinking of that phrase were about its exact opposite—hanging on. There was that iconic poster that arose ages ago, sometime in the 1970's if I remember right, with the kitten on it. The kitten is hanging from a branch with a wide-eyed look on its face, and the words below called out to us saying, "Hang in there, Baby."

That message and ones like it are pervasive in our culture: "Stick to it," we're told. "Quitters never win, and winners never quit." "Hanging in there" seems to be one of the great instructions we receive from many sources. And often that's just the encouragement we need to hear. Persistence and perseverance are deep spiritual qualities. The early Universalists who founded our congregation succeeded in building our faith because they found in the Gospel of Love a grounding anchor that held them against all manner of hardship, fear, and derision.

We are often good at holding on—so good that it seems that sometimes we hold on too much, for too long, to the wrong things. We hold on to grudges and ancient slights in relationships that could be filled with at least compassionate tolerance, if not divine love. We hold on to stuff we no longer need, and to habits that don't improve our lives. We hold on to the conveniences of our times so tightly that we call them necessities and can't imagine our lives without them. We hold on to our self-image as active and strong even when the natural order of life says that we will occasionally, and more often so as we age, become weakened and in need of support. We hold on to our existence when the natural order of life offers a cycle that all beings must eventually let go and die.

Sometimes I think that holding on when we should let go is the great spiritual struggle of our age. I find myself wondering—maybe that kitten shouldn't hang in there any more. I can't see what's below it in the picture, but I'm betting that the photographer wasn't sitting high up in a tree when they took the picture, so I'm thinking that the ground really isn't that far below. Just how long has that kitten been hanging in there? And to what end? Maybe it should just let go, and come on down from the branches, deal with the consequences, if there are any, and get on with life.

"Hold fast to what is good," the Apostle Paul wrote to the Thessalonians, "but test everything...Do not quench the Spirit"

Sometimes holding on is good, sometimes it's not. Don't get stuck hanging from the wrong tree, or from even the right tree for too long. With prayer,

with wisdom, hold on to what is good, but with great faith in an ever unfolding, ever expanding life of love, be sure, too, to let go when its time. Offering Recipients cont. from pg. 2

March 9—Willing Hands

Willing Hands was founded in 2005 by employees of the Hanover Food Co-op. Their mission is to keep food from going to waste by distributing fresh produce and other perishable items from 25 grocery stores, restaurants, and other providers to more than 50 social service agencies in our region, including our own Hartland Food Shelf, which takes place in our church every Friday morning. 95% of the food Willing Hands donates is fresh fruit and vegetables and all the food they distribute is given free of charge. March 16—The Annual Program Fund of the Unitarian Universalist Association

At the request of several of the members of our congregation, the collection this week will support our contribution to the Annual Program Fund of the UUA. The Annual Program Fund of the UUA is the primary means of support for the work of our denomination, including ministerial training and credentialing, religious education programs, advocacy and witness work, and resource development and publishing. As a member congregation, the UUA requests a "fair share" contribution from every congregation of \$60 per member. Currently, and in recent years, the budget approved by the members of our congregation has included a significantly smaller amount for these, our UUA "dues". Many members

The Board's Broadcast

The Governing Board held its monthly meeting on February 9, 2014. In attendance were: Mary Erdei, Doug Hart, John Osborne, Sara Morin, Dan Poor, Colleen Spence, Tamara Ross and Becky Howe.

The January Board minutes were reviewed and accepted as written.

The Minister's report was reviewed. Mary Erdei used the gratitude portion from last month to send out thank-you notes, a total of 7 notes. An "In Gratitude" page was also added to the newsletter. There has been no reaction positive or negative to the inclusion of the "In Gratitude" page in the newsletter, so the process will continue. The Board members will also bring forward names of those deserving our thanks.

The minister's report was accepted.

Tamara Ross presented the treasurer's report for the first time in her new role as Treasurer. (Great job Tamara!!) She will be sending out letters specifying total yearly donations to those who request them. A future plan is for all those donating will receive a note. The W2 has gone out, the W3 is completed, quarterly taxes have been paid, and donations have been sent to Burundi. A busy first month for Tamara.

There seems to be some confusion regarding donations to Burundi. Due to the high cost of money transfer, Tamara will hold donations to accumulate rather than sending them individually. Paul will send out an email clarifying this.

The board discussed the much needed Nomination Circle. We are having difficulty identifying persons to serve as nominators. Dan has spoken to Sue Buckholz regarding mentoring future leaders of the church. At this time Sue feels she is unable to fulfill the time commitment that this would require. The Board recognizes Sue's expertise and hopes that she may be able to help in a less time-consuming way. Jill Lloyd suggested as a possibility. Dan will continue to follow up with Sue. The Board members will review the directory to help selecting possible people for this role. Becky will send out weekly reminders, as several replacements will be needed in June.

The upcoming changes to the UUA Retirement Plan were discussed. We have received notice from the UUA that their retirement plan is changing, and the Board must ratify these changes and comply with new requirements. It appears that there is no change from what we are currently supporting as a retirement plan, but the changes will need review. The Finance Circle will meet and bring a recommendation back to the Board at the next meeting.
