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The Board's Broadcast

This month the Governing Board had a relatively light agenda.

The role of the church treasurer, and the need for an assistant treasurer, was a major discussion. Doug Hart and Dan Poor agreed to work on the requirements for an assistant treasurer. Aside from the need to lighten Doug's workload, an assistant treasurer would fill in for Doug if he was unable for any reason to do the work. This would include working with Doug to understand the structure of the accounts and the implementation in Quicken.

Also discussed was the need to perform an internal audit on a yearly basis. Doug will make a request of the church membership for an interested and qualified member to perform the audit and become an assistant treasurer.

Doug has changed the vendor for our direct-debit process, which will save us some charges for this process. Members are encouraged to use direct-debit for pledge payments.

The only upcoming event for discussion was the chocolate auction. This seemed to be going well, so no action of the Board was required. John Osborne contacted Joe Sullivan of the UUA Northern New England district, and got advice and a guideline document for reviewing the bylaws. This document will be parsed among the Board members to compare to our current bylaws and make suggestions for changes. This work will be completed over the next three months, in time for the next membership meeting.

The next Board meeting will be March 4 at 7:00 pm in the parsonage. Members are welcome to attend, as always.
