Engaging the Spirit

October 2013 — "The Veil (Between the Worlds)"

When you are enlightened enough, "there is no duality, and all the worlds are one."

One of you sent me that thought after my request for your input on October's theme, "The Veil (Between the Worlds)." And I suspect it's true. See existence from a high enough plane and the boundaries likely disappear, like a view of the earth from space—life and death, physical and spiritual, human and divine—all the dualities emerge as false, and all the worlds become one.

Well, I don't know about you, but for my part, in the midst of every day, I feel so far from that kind of enlightenment in any real way. Oh, I can say it intellectually—that all the worlds are one—but I have to admit, that if I truly experience that unity in any form, it's always in a way that feels like I'm seeing it through a veil.

When I'm doing my work, living my life, and especially when I'm preaching, praying, meditating, or sitting at the bedside with you when you're ill—I catch glimpses of that world. And those glimpses are enough to drive me, enough to send me hints of what could be, and likely is. But the veil remains. And imperfection remains. And I wonder what my life and spirit would be like if someday, I could reach out, and push that veil aside. Could I handle the clarity? Could you? Could anyone in this earthbound life? Like the boundaries between life and death, and the physical and spiritual worlds, the line between truly enlightened and simply insane sometimes seems mysteriously unclear.

And still, autumn comes around, and the leaves burn with light, and the forest opens up its heart, and the air becomes crisp enough to wake me up from a summer's slumber, and I start to feel, from time to time, the veil slide a bit out of the way.

The lifting of the veil is the promise of the end of the duality, the promise of the hopeful unity, of the great cycle. It is seeing all existence, all time as nothing more than one moment in which all possibility, all happening is going on all at the same time, or maybe more truly, it's seeing all existence outside of time—which is nothing more than our arrangement of reality into a way that makes sense through the distortion of the veil.

This time of year we dress our children in terrifying costumes, and they go outside to roam the streets, and we and they experience it all as fun. The veil between fear and enjoyment thins.

This time of year, we gather to share our building, our work, and our care with about a thousand people at Turkey Suppers—and the veil between our faith community and our wider community thins for a time, too. We set aside, for a time, our lines of doctrine and belief, and we say, "Let everyone of all faiths and of no faith come and share a cup of coffee and pie, and walk through the silent auction in our sacred sanctuary. In this time of gathering darkness, hospitality, no doctrine, is our rule." There will be time enough to engage the old debates when the snow flies, and we're drawn inside around the fire in the months to come.

October 27—The Hartland Community Nursing Program

Community nursing is an effort to foster community-based connections and support in the midst of the disconnection of the modern health care system. A community nurse doesn't provide direct treatment, but works with local hospitals and other agencies, and makes direct face-toface connections with people in the community, particularly those "aging in place", to support their health care needs. A group from Hartland has been meeting for about a year now, and working with the Upper Valley Community Nursing Project, to set guidelines and to set up a community nursing program in our town, which we hope will be underway in January. Members of this group have included several members and friends of our congregation, including Joan Fariel, Doug Hart, Jill Lloyd, and Paul Sawyer. The Board's Broadcast

The Governing Board met on September 9. John Osborne and Becky Howe could not attend; minutes were taken by Mary Erdei. Thanks, Mary. Attending were Dan Poor, Sara Morin, Coleen Spence, Paul Sawyer, Doug Hart, Jill Crowley, and Mary Erdei.

Jill Crowley began the meeting reporting that the repair expense for the stairs ran a bit over the original estimate, because the structure underneath the stairs was bad. Jill told the board that we need a new railing as our current railing is "out of compliance" with state regulations. Local carpenter/artist Bob Barrett had jerry-rigged the old railing for a funeral where attendance was large. Two bids came in, for approximately \$2700 for repair of the railing, and Bob Bartlett's design estimate would be no more than \$5000. His work is artistically done, period work, with a lifetime to be determined by a call to Bob by Jill. The board discussed and gave approval for Barrett's design/work with regards to the detailing and focus on the importance of an entryway that was coincident with our goals.

Paul's report was accepted; some discussion by Paul regarding requests of him presiding over weddings and funerals out of the congregation and the immediate area. Those will most likely be turned down.

Paul also reported that the reason for the nursery children now being watched by the older RE youth is a cost-saving measure, and not any slight against Dan.

Doug reported that the new members' pledges put us right in the ball park for our original pledge goals. The Treasurer's report was reviewed and accepted. Dan asked Doug if he would have a 1st draft for our next meeting regarding the job description for a new Treasurer or Treasurers after Doug retires (this January). Paul asked Doug if he could put this announcement and job opening in the September 18 newsletter and reiterated a need for two people, one with signing privileges.

The Spending Policy discussion ensued over problems we have had resulting from clarity over spending budgets. Paul explained that we need to keep clear that there are really two types of expenses: professional expenses (those not subject to review by the board-Paul/Sara/Patty) and budget expenses (also known as administrative expenses for running the church). Under these budgetary expenses, unplanned expenses over \$100 should go to the committee chairs for approval. Staff and committee chairs who need to spend over \$1000 of their budget,

should come before the board to fulfill those needs and get approval. In the past, as well as currently, it continues to be a challenge for members to front money for expenses before getting reimbursements.

John Osborne has sent out a draft of the "Turkey Supper Guidebook," the intent of which is to make running the turkey suppers a well-documented process for any volunteers signing up. It was agreed that the Board members would read and review John's "guidebook" and address any issues, comments, or clarifications to John.

We revisited the issue of Turkey Supper dates, agreeing it would be best to host our suppers for the 3 weekends in a row rather than separate them.

We will have a booth for whoopie pies at Moondance, October 11, 2013.

We are looking at November 17 for a (Chili) Workday.


We were in agreement that budgeting for the church should be an ongoing process, rather than set up under time constraints. The Board members were asked to identify by September 13, three individuals with high energy who could, with spirit:

- Write a letter with regards to the church and its relationship to the community, its energy and commitments to all of us and the wider world
 - Think about what to do to kick off the canvass "campaign"
- Help to get people focused around the campaign in anticipation of the organization of the canvass.

The Board members needed to send the names of this 'dream team' to Sara Morin by September 13.

The letters written by these individuals should go out by November 17, prior to voting at the semiannual meeting on December 8.

The Board discussed the proposal for a UU Bed & Breakfast as a fundraiser. Sara has met with interested individuals, passed out sign-up sheets, and updated us on the possibilities for this and other possibilities of engaging others and fundraising for the church. It was agreed that, as far as a timetable, we should organize before next year's leaf-peeping season.

Treasurer's Notes

The Board is looking for a Treasurer and an Assistant Treasurer. I've been doing this for ten years and I'd like to get some new people to take over. One individual might want to take this on as I have but we can break it into two functions and with the help of Quicken and our bank's on line and automatic processing, the work would not be burdensome. Both people would have access to Quicken.

My view is that the Treasurer would be responsible for paying bills, submitting the quarterly wage tax reports and ordering cash from our investment fund when the budget calls for it.

The Assistant Treasurer could handle the income side; overseeing the weekly collection deposit and recording pledge payments and other income (fundraisers, special collections, rents, etc.).

Paying the Bills:

We get a dozen or so bills each month and pay most of them electronically thru the bank. Occasionally, I'll write a check. Our five staff members are paid automatically by the bank each month; the Treasurer only needs the figure and enter the new amounts when we raise salaries, once a year. The format for this is in Quicken. The recipient of the weekly special collection would be evident in Quicken and a check would be sent to that organization.

All expense payments are entered in Quicken; any repeat bills and payroll are automatic.

Monthly the Treasurer prints an Income & Expense report to the Board, usually with comments.

Treasurer provides in late October, the Treasurer pro-

vides a projected Income Statement that the Stewardship Committee will use to prepare our annual budget for Board approval in November.

Managing the Income:

The weekly collection is counted by two volunteers who count the money together and make up the deposit. One takes the locked deposit bag to the bank's night deposit slot (requires a key). Our current volunteers are: Sara Morin, Bram Oort, Robert Jaarsma or me. From the deposit slip, the Assistant Treasurer would enter the pledge payments in Quicken as well as other gifts, particularly the special collection.

Each fall we host three turkey suppers and a silent auction. These festive events bring together our community in a unique way as we serve 275-325 hungry friends each evening and raise money to support our church. Before the meal, diners have a chance to look over and bid on unique silent auction items. Everyone is welcome at these suppers, tickets are sold upstairs



in the sanctuary along side the silent auction items. Table-by-table, guests are led downstairs to the fellowship hall for food and conversation. Each week 15 turkeys are roasted, made-from-scratch stuffing, gravy, squash, mashed potatoes, rolls, pickles, cranberry sauce and coleslaw are created and served family-style.

The meal is finished off with a slice of homemade pie.

These three dinners and auction make up an important part of our fundraising efforts and we rely on many hands helping to make them possible. There are many ways you can help:

Let's Make FUSH a Welcoming Congregation!

(Organizational Meeting: October 13)

What do we mean by "Make" FUSH a welcoming congregation?

"I thought we were already welcoming," you say? Well, we are and we aren't. By "Welcoming," we mean we want to be recognized as a congregation that has taken intentional steps to become more welcoming to, and inclusive of, people with marginalized sexual orientations and gender identities.

Unitarian Universalism is widely known for its commitment to welcome and equality for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ) individuals and families. You may not know it, but ours is one of the few religions that ordains openly LGBTQ people, and the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) also provides assistance in their settlement. Our LGBTQ clergy

(who are permitted to partner or marry) participate fully in our faith community as pastors in some of our largest congregations.



The Welcoming Congregation Program

The Welcoming Congregation Program is a volunteer program for Unitarian Universalist congregations that want to be recognized in their communities for their commitment to LGBTQ people.

First launched in 1990 (http://www.uua.org/lgbtq/welcoming/program/index.shtml), the program grew out of an understanding that widespread prejudices and ignorance about lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender,

and queer (LGBTQ) people existed within Unitarian Universalism, which resulted in the exclusion of LGBTQ people from our congregations. Today, 66% of U.S. Unitarian Universalist (UU) congregations and 94% of Canadian UU congregations are recognized as Welcoming Congregations. FUSH should be recognized too.

- Travel 3 miles and turn left onto Weed Road.
- Soon after (.6 mi), at the T-stop, turn right onto Garvin Hill Road.
- Continue about 1 mile and you'll come to a steep uphill.
- After the hill look for gate on the left opposite a large hay field, with a small sign on it saying something like: "no dogs allowed, our cows are in the field." This gate is the entrance to the summit.
- Follow the "road" to the top on foot, or by rugged 4x4. Some rides may be available. If you're driving up, and have space, please wait and check at the bottom to see if there is someone in need of a ride.
