MAY 7 DESOLATION, CONSOLATION, WHITE SUPREMACY AND OUR FAITH

We'll introduce this month's worship theme, "Consolation and Desolation" with a special exploration of institutional racism and white supremacy in light of recent events in the leadership of the Unitarian Universalist Association.

In response to several troubling recent events in our movement, and to the long-standing expressed pain of people of color in our faith tradition, the Black Lives of UU Organizing Collective, with official endorsement by the UUA Board, has called for all UU organizations and congregations to explore the topic of white supremacy on either April 30 or May 7. Honoring this call, in this service we will join hundreds of other Unitarian Universalist congregations in exploring this topic in our congregation and our faith. *The collection will support Black Lives of UU Organizing Collective*.

MAY 14 DESOLATION, CONSOLATION, AND THE LIFE OF FAITH

Reflections on this month's theme and the chance for our faith to offer consolation in the midst of the desolate times of our lives, as well as a prayer for mothers of all sorts and conditions. *The collection will support The Family Place*.

MAY 8 BLACK LIVES OF UNITARIAN UNIVERSALISM ORGANIZING COLLECTIVE (BLUU)

Formed in the wake of several conversations among Black UUs at the July 2015 Movement for Black Lives Convening in Cleveland, OH, BLUU works to provide support, information & resources for Black Unitarian Universalists; and to expand the role & visibility of Black UUs within our faith. Our collection this week will be part of a commitment of a donation of \$200,000 to BLUU by the Northern New England District of the UUA—\$100,000 from the NNED Endowment, to be matched by \$100,000 from NNED Congregations—approved by the annual meeting of the NNED April 21, 2017.

MAY 14 THE FAMILY PLACE

Founded in 1985, The Family Place is a parent-child center serving the entire Upper Valley region. They offer comprehensive services for families and children, including home visits, training and support for new parents, early intervention for children with special needs, playgroups, resources for financial aid for child care, and other support for families. They also operate an important service through their child advocacy center, working with state agencies to offer a safe environment for legal testimony and follow-up support for children who have made a disclosure of abuse. Rev. Paul Sawyer serves on the board of the Family Place, and dear friend and former DRE of our congregation, Nancy Theriault, is on the staff. MAY 21 NATIONAL ALLIANCE ON MENTAL ILLNESS OF THE UPPER VALLEY

NAMI, the National Alliance on Mental Illness, is a grassroots mental health organization dedicated to building better lives for the millions of Americans affected by mental illness. Begun in 1979 by a collection of families gathered around a kitchen table, NAMI is now a national organization that works to support people with mental illness and their loved ones through education and advocacy, and through leadership in all areas working for understanding of mental illness throughout our society. ABOUT MEMBERSHIP

About Membership in the First Universalist Society of Hartland Four Corners

Our congregation is made up of both "members" and "friends," with varying degrees of commitment to our work. Whether you formally join our congregation as a member, or whether you prefer to consider yourself a non-member "friend," you are welcome and encouraged to participate actively in the life of our church community.

What it Means to Be a Member of Our Congregation

Members of our congregation are those who have made a formal commitment to our community by "signing the book"—declaring their commitment publicly by setting their signature to our book of membership, in consultation with our minister.

According to our by-laws, membership is available to all those over 18 years of age who:

- "State that they are in agreement with the purposes of our Society and of the Unitarian Universalist Association"
- Are willing to participate in the work and activity of our community
- Are willing to support our work with their time, energy, and resources

There is no set time frame or specific guideline about when you might choose to become a member, but we do ask you to spend some significant time learning about the mission, history, theology, practices, and culture of our congregation through regular attendance, through our "Introduction to Unitarian Universalism" sessions, and/or through conversations with our minister and other leaders of our community.

Members of our congregation can serve in volunteer leadership positions on our governing board, board of trustees, and our committee on ministry, and can vote in congregational meetings (please note that our by-laws require that to vote to amend our by-laws, or to call or dismiss a minister, an individual must have been an active member of the congregation for at least a full year).

Members are entitled to the services of the minister and the use of the church building for rites of passage (weddings, memorial services, child dedications, etc.) at no cost. Members are formally considered "Unitarian Universalists" by the Unitarian Universalist Association, and receive *Unitarian Universalist World* magazine at no additional cost.

What it Means to Be a "Friend" of Our Congregation

Friends of our congregation are welcome to participate in nearly all aspects of the life of our church, including attending programs and services, serving on committees, leading layled worship, and, of course pledging to support our work financially.

They are not eligible to vote in congregational meetings, or to serve on our governing board, committee on ministry, or as a trustee. They can, however, serve in other leadership roles in church life, including serving as a champion of an activity.

"Active" Membership Status, Moving Away, and other Concerns

We ask members of our congregation to maintain their "active" status through ongoing participation and/or support of our congregation. Members who discontinue participation or support of our congregation, for whatever reason, may be listed in our records as "Inactive" and may need to reactivate their membership in order to vote or to hold a leadership position.

Even members that move out of town are welcome to remain as "active" members, through regular financial or other support and through making an effort to stay connected in some fashion with our congregation.

For those who move either to or from our region, it's good to know that Unitarian Universalist tradition allows individuals to be members of more than one congregation, provided the member meets the requirements set forth by each congregation. Under the same stipulation, we are also open to members who continue to hold ongoing membership in communities identified with other faith traditions.

Youth who are active participants in our congregation are welcome to become members after their 18th birthday, and can be considered active members during their young adult years, even if their work or school commitments leave them unable to participate regularly in the life of our congregation. We do not have a formal "confirmation" program for our youth. Youth considering membership should speak with the minister.

YOUTH GROUP NOTES

Our congregation offers activities for youth in grades 7-12 (or the homeschool equivalent) through two youth groups—the **Junior Youth Group, for those in grades 7 & 8**, and the **Senior Youth Group for high school students**. Both groups are offered in conjunction with our friends and neighbors from the Hartland Congregational Church, and are led by the Rev. Lucia Jackson, The Rev. Paul Sawyer, and David Morin.

Both groups offer fun, fellowship, games, and a youth-centered exploration and development of faith. We gather to support one another, to have a good time, and to think about some of the big questions of life in a safe environment. We have regular meetings with activities, time to check in, reflection, and games. We also offer special events throughout the year including service opportunities, fundraising brunches at both churches, trips to Dartmouth sporting events, game nights, and, for senior youth, our annual week-long mission trip to New Haven, CT in July.



If you've been involved with our youth groups or if you've got someone just entering our youth group age, and you've been involved with our Religious Education Program for children, you should receive a full calendar and further information by US mail (old school!) soon. If you are a youth in our community, or if you know someone who you think would like to be involved, make sure we've got your information so we can keep you in the loop.

SOME GUIDELINES FOR CANDLES OF JOY AND SORROW

Our Candles of Joy and Sorrow are an important aspect of our worship in our congregation. As such, it's worth spending some energy from time to time thinking about how to make them meaningful and connecting.

There is a lot of latitude as to what is appropriate to share during Joys and Sorrows, and I certainly don't want to discourage you from lighting candles when the spirit moves you. Also, I firmly believe that Candles of Joy and Sorrow belong to you—to the congregation—and that they are not mine to limit or control except perhaps in extreme circumstances.

Still, there are some good general guidelines for Joys and Sorrows, and I invite you to work with me to keep those guidelines in all of our thoughts as we experience this time each week:

- First and always, simply remember that lighting a candle is a form of prayer, and in that time, please offer only something that is worthy of a prayer.
- In all cases, short and general is better than long and detailed—particularly in the cause of surgeries or injuries!
- Don't light a candle for someone else unless they ask you to, or unless you get permission from them to do so. Offer what comes from the joys and sorrows of your own heart and your own life. Watch the line between prayer and gossip.
- It is ok to light a candle silently, if you prefer.
- Candles aren't time for announcements. If you have an announcement that you feel wasn't covered appropriately in announcement time, don't make it during candles. You are welcome to make announcements during coffee hour.
- Notice that we consciously use language of "joys and *sorrows*" and not "joys and *concerns*." That's a reminder that not everything that is "concerning" rises to the level of sharing for this time.
- Avoid purely political reflection, especially if you feel you need to explain a position in detail—though lighting a candle and briefly noting a cause that brings you joy or sorrow personally is generally fine. If you have a political cause you want to express in more depth, speak with me and, if appropriate, we'll find a way to get your information out to the congregation.
- Remember that our candles are a time for all ages. We believe that our children should know about the world and about what brings us joy and sorrow, but it's good to keep your language and your descriptions appropriate for all.
- Also, honoring that this is a multigenerational time give extra leeway to children, as to what brings them joy or sorrow. Don't be quick to declare something a child says as trivial. Remember being that age and what truly mattered to you. And if you happen to be one of those with relatively low tolerance for children, at least notice that our children, whatever they're sharing, are generally very good about being brief. And remember, too, that some of our most poignant candles ever have been brought by our children.
- If you have questions about what is appropriate, or how to offer feedback to someone who you feel has overstepped one or more of these lines, please let me know!

This month the children of our RE program will be joyfully playing to the tune of this classic nursery rhyme:


