Our congregation was founded in 1802 in close partnership with fellow Universalists in Woodstock, Barnard, Bethel, and Bridgewater, and together our congregations were famously known far and wide as the "Sister Societies." In those earliest days the Universalist faith in our region was able to grow and to thrive largely because of the strong bonds of connection that we shared with our neighboring congregations. Currently, the Upper Valley region is home to five Unitarian Universalist congregations—us, of course, along with congregations in Norwich, South Strafford, Barnard, and Woodstock—and for the first time, this year, all five have committed to be a part of this gathering! This combined service will be an opportunity for us to strengthen our connections of mutual support and encouragement, and just to spend some enjoyable time together. ### FROM YOUR GOVERNING BOARD

Notes from the Governing Board is back! Watch for a blurb from us each month to stay up-to-date on our meeting discussions and decisions. For those of you less familiar with the Unitarian Universalist governing structure and the function of our Governing Board, we work to make sure bills are paid, contributions are deposited and that all of that is accounted for and that we are staying on budget from month to month. We also make sure that day-to-day operations and committees and circles are running and aligned with church mission and objectives. If a crisis occurs or an opportunity arises, we work to address them as needed, whether that is to make decisions on the church's behalf or to bring the decision making process to the whole congregation. When to do which is often a measure of expediency vs. expense and level of impact. There are some things that we don't do. We don't minister. Our beloved Minister ministers. And our Outreach committee ministers. We don't schedule contractors for repairs or fix things ourselves



(although, in truth, most board members have at one time or another fixed a thing or two); it's not a function of the board. We don't campaign for pledges (although, in truth, most board members have done so at one time or another); that, also, is not a direct function of the board. What we do take responsibility for is making sure these committees are up and running, which brings me to my appeal of the month, which is to consider, if you happen to be looking for a place to step in, joining one of several operational committees. There is the Outreach committee, buildings and grounds, long term planning, pledge committee, greeting committee, lay leadership committee, fund raising committee, nomination selection committee, trustee committee, RE Circle, Coffee hour committee. I am not sure these are all called committees, but they are all part of how our church functions in community. And there is a place here for you if you have a little time to give. Especially building and grounds...but don't feel tied to any one thing. If you are not sure you are able to commit time to a function that meets regularly but would like to pitch in, though we keep it casual during the summer, you can always host a coffee hour or sign up for a volunteer slot on one of several fundraiser activities that happen throughout the year or share your handy-person skills and take on one of many handy-person jobs that need doing around the church. Paul will begin to communicate handy-person needs in his weekly email notes.

The Board has had a relatively active past couple of months. At the end of April, we all met for our second annual working retreat at Chez la Poor, in scenic Cornish. Ricky and Dan Poor have graciously hosted our group for two years in a row, for day-long meetings that have allowed us to take deep dives on particular topics.

This year's focus was an internal look at how we function as a Board. This included discussion of our purpose is as the Governing Board, how we function – things we can improve on, and a look at our short and long term goals. Some of the key outcomes included making an effort to communicate more with the congregation through newsletter notes and periodic announcements on Sundays. Reinforcement of our intent to make decisions through the lens of how best to reflect who we are as a church in community with each other and the people around us. To ask ourselves: Is this who we are? Is this sustainable? Are we reaching out? Does this promote growth? Are we agreeing in love?

#### **Recent decisions:**

**May's Meeting:** No motions made to be approved. Reviewed budget – on track. Vt-Quebec Grant Application made for floor improvements. Water sensors available free through insurance. Passing information off to building and grounds to review and decide. In anticipation of building maintenance and improvement requests, need to develop process for handling Capital Improvements.

**June's Meeting:** Chuck Fenton and the Long Range Planning Committee have spent long hours developing a set of recommendations for building maintenance and improvement. The board received a presentation of the recommendations and immediately approved floor replacement for the fellowship hall, with the understanding that this had been previously approved and the funding already earmarked for the work and also approved roof repair of a hole left behind as a result of the weathervane falling from the steeple several years ago. The Board also tentatively agreed to approve the installation of a new sink in the kitchen, if a decision can be easily made regarding location. The remainder of the recommendations are improvements that will require approval by the congregation and a capital campaign fund. More to come on this as a presentation for the congregation is developed.

The next Governing Board meeting is scheduled for July 17, 2017 at 7:00 PM at the Parsonage House. Our meetings are open for all to attend. You are always welcome.

Dartmouth is one of 20 universities nationwide serving as a host to Mandela Washington Fellows, and through our own Don Foster, who is one of the community members involved in the program (and someone with extensive experience working on issues of development and leadership in Africa himself) we were honored to hear from several of the young leaders participating in last year's inaugural class of Fellows. ## **ABOUT MEMBERSHIP**

#### About Membership in the First Universalist Society of Hartland Four Corners

Our congregation is made up of both "members" and "friends," with varying degrees of commitment to our work. Whether you formally join our congregation as a member, or whether you prefer to consider yourself a non-member "friend," you are welcome and encouraged to participate actively in the life of our church community.

#### What it Means to Be a Member of Our Congregation

Members of our congregation are those who have made a formal commitment to our community by "signing the book"—declaring their commitment publicly by setting their signature to our book of membership, in consultation with our minister.

According to our by-laws, membership is available to all those over 18 years of age who:

- "State that they are in agreement with the purposes of our Society and of the Unitarian Universalist Association"
- Are willing to participate in the work and activity of our community
- Are willing to support our work with their time, energy, and resources

There is no set time frame or specific guideline about when you might choose to become a member, but we do ask you to spend some significant time learning about the mission, history, theology, practices, and culture of our congregation through regular attendance, through our "Introduction to Unitarian Universalism" sessions, and/or through conversations with our minister and other leaders of our community.

Members of our congregation can serve in volunteer leadership positions on our governing board, board of trustees, and our committee on ministry, and can vote in congregational meetings (please note that our by-laws require that to vote to amend our by-laws, or to call or dismiss a minister, an individual must have been an active member of the congregation for at least a full year).

Members are entitled to the services of the minister and the use of the church building for rites of passage (weddings, memorial services, child dedications, etc.) at no cost. Members are formally considered "Unitarian Universalists" by the Unitarian Universalist Association, and receive *Unitarian Universalist World* magazine at no additional cost.

#### What it Means to Be a "Friend" of Our Congregation

Friends of our congregation are welcome to participate in nearly all aspects of the life of our church, including attending programs and services, serving on committees, leading layled worship, and, of course pledging to support our work financially.

They are not eligible to vote in congregational meetings, or to serve on our governing board, committee on ministry, or as a trustee. They can, however, serve in other leadership roles in church life, including serving as a champion of an activity.

#### "Active" Membership Status, Moving Away, and other Concerns

We ask members of our congregation to maintain their "active" status through ongoing participation and/or support of our congregation. Members who discontinue participation or support of our congregation, for whatever reason, may be listed in our records as "Inactive" and may need to reactivate their membership in order to vote or to hold a leadership position.

Even members that move out of town are welcome to remain as "active" members, through regular financial or other support and through making an effort to stay connected in some fashion with our congregation.

For those who move either to or from our region, it's good to know that Unitarian Universalist tradition allows individuals to be members of more than one congregation, provided the member meets the requirements set forth by each congregation. Under the same stipulation, we are also open to members who continue to hold ongoing membership in communities identified with other faith traditions.

Youth who are active participants in our congregation are welcome to become members after their 18th birthday, and can be considered active members during their young adult years, even if their work or school commitments leave them unable to participate regularly in the life of our congregation. We do not have a formal "confirmation" program for our youth. Youth considering membership should speak with the minister.
